The office of emergency management is currently rebuilding and restructuring the program. Due to these changes, the MJHMP that is currently due for the 5 yr update in need of consultant oversight for the completion of a concise and well developed plan that will represent the overall county hazard.

Who will the mitigation activity benefit and/or impact?

The Gila County Office of Emergency Management, citizens of Gila County to include residents in incorporated and unincorporated areas, and many visitors of the area throughout the year.

How will the mitigation activity be implemented?

The plan contract will be sent out as an RFP through the Gila County Finance department and awarded to the most qualified vendor. A planning team consisting of first responders, the Gila County LEPC, and local citizenry will make up the planning team.

The office of emergency management maintains all county mandated plans. The MJHMP is due for its 5 year review and re-write to include new hazards and include with it any changes to previously identified hazards. The consultant will work in conjunction with the OEM, local fire/ police/ Sheriff and identified members of the public that will comprise the planning team.

The Gila County Office of Emergency Management will manage the overall mitigation activity and prepare any deliverables as designated by this grant.
